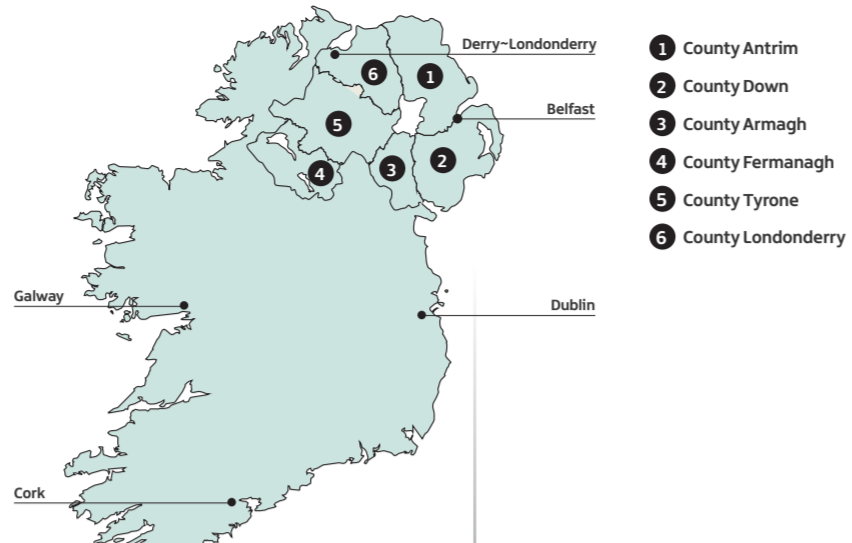


Useful Information

Binevenagh Mountain

Appearing as the Dothraki Grasslands in Season 5 when Daenerys Targaryen was rescued by her dragon, Binevenagh Mountain extends for over six miles across the peninsula of Magilligan dominating the skyline over the villages of Bellarena, Downhill, Castlerock and Benone beach.

Cushendun Caves

Game of Thrones® fans will recognise the ancient caves at Cushendun as the place where Melisandre gave birth to the shadow baby after being brought ashore by Davos Seaworthy in Season 2.

Ballintoy Harbour & Beach

Ballintoy Harbour on the North Antrim Coast is close to Larrybane and Carrick-a-Rede Rope Bridge. These locations have been used for several scenes in Pyke and The Iron Islands.

Castle Ward

A stunning 820 acre walled demesne with a spectacular house, an exotic sunken garden and woodland overlooking Strangford Lough. Castle Ward was Winterfell, seat of House Stark, in Season 1.

Tollymore Forest Park

This forest park in the foothills of the Mourne Mountains is home to woodlands, streams, grottos and caves. The forest was used in several scenes including the opening scene of the entire series.

Inch Abbey

Inch Abbey was founded by John de Courcy and sits on the bank of the Quoile River, Co Down. This has been a location for a significant scene and was Robb Stark's camp in Season 1.
